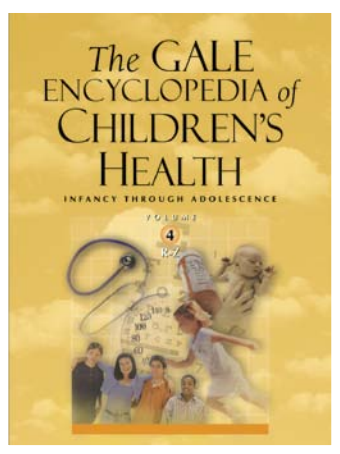

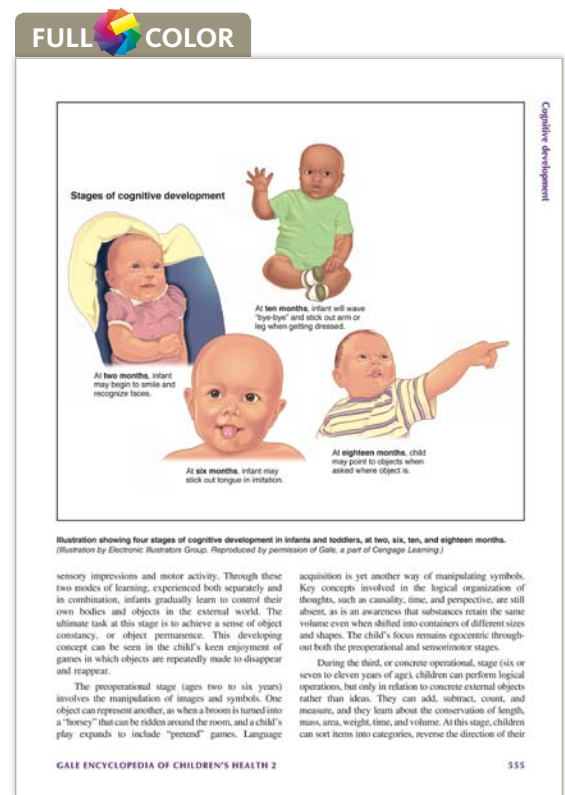

KEY TERMS

Inflammation—A local reaction to tissue injury or damage, usually characterized by pain, swelling, and redness.
Ulcer—A site of damage to the skin or mucous membrane that is characterized by the formation of pus, death of tissue, and is frequently accompanied by an inflammatory reaction.

There is no cure for canker sores. They do not get larger or occur more frequently with age.

Car safety seats

Definition

Car safety seats are specially designed infant and child restraint devices for motor vehicles. There are several types of car safety seats:

- car beds
- infant-only seats
- convertible seats
- forward-facing seats
- combination seats
- built-in safety seats
- travel vests
- booster seats

Purpose

When properly installed and used, car safety seats help protect children from injury and death in motor vehicle accidents. They reduce infant fatalities by 71% and fatal injuries to toddlers aged one to four by 84%. Older children are 66% safer with a booster seat than with a seat belt alone. In the United States, car safety seats are required for all children under 40 lb (18 kg). Requirements for children over 40 lb (18 kg) vary from state to state.

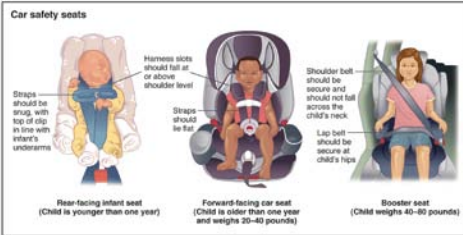
